

















Electronic Journals

What are electronic journals?	They are journals that have some form of electronic access. This does not mean that full-text is automatically available. Some journals only have Table of Contents electronically.
What formats do e-journals come in?	PDF – requires Adobe Acrobat. HTML – HTML can change the layout of an article, it usually is more pages than the original citation and there may or may not be graphics.
Can I access e-journals from home?	Yes, but access to these e-journals have a restricted license, and only University of Florida faculty, staff, or students are able to access these resources from off campus. You will need to use your Gatorlink Account or 14-digit library bar code. For more information: http://www.library.health.ufl.edu/information/connect.html
What years are available full-text?	Dates vary widely depending on the publisher. Some may be from 1997 – present OR only the last 2 years OR some don't allow access to the latest articles but offer access to earlier years.

Database	Searching Tips
<p>Certain full-text articles are available in:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • PubMed 	<p>In PubMed  select <input checked="" type="checkbox"/> Links to free full text and you will retrieve all free full-text articles.</p> <p>When doing regular searches, be sure you are accessing through the PubMed link from the HSCL database page. When you look at your citations in the “Abstract” or “Citation” display, you will see icons for those we have available full-text:</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Environ Health Perspect. 2008 Sep;116(9):1248-53.</p> <div style="text-align: center;">    </div>
<p>In EBSCOHOST databases some articles are available full-text in:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • CINAHL • PsychINFO <p>Most articles are available full-text in:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Alt HealthWatch • Health Business FullTEXT • SPORTDiscus with Full Text 	<p>Some citations are directly linked to full text:  PDF Full Text</p> <p>If there is no full text icon, you can click on the  button and another screen opens showing further possibilities for finding full-text options.</p> <p>You <i>can</i> limit your search to only <u>directly linked</u> full text articles by checking the box in the LIMIT YOUR RESULTS section section in your initial search.</p> <div style="text-align: right;">   </div> <p>NOTE: This process will bypass those articles when there are other full-text options.</p>

<p>Indirect access in Ovid databases:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • IPA • EBM Reviews 	<p>Find links to full-text and PDF articles by clicking on  Ovid Full Text link to the far right of the record.</p> <p>If there is no full text icon, you can click on  and another screen opens showing further possibilities for finding full-text options.</p>
<p>Gale Group offers mostly full text in:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Health Reference Center Academic • Health and Wellness Resource Center & Alternative Health Module 	<p>Some citations contain a direct link to full text: </p> <p>If there is no icon, you can click on  and another screen opens showing further possibilities for finding full-text options.</p> <p>You <i>can</i> limit your search to only <u>directly linked</u> full text articles by checking the FULL TEXT ARTICLES box  in your initial search.</p> <p>NOTE: This process will bypass those articles with other full-text options.</p>
<p>Indirect access in most FirstSearch databases including: Electronic Collections Online</p>	<p>When you see your results in these databases, each record will have this:</p> <p> See more details for locating this item</p> <p>Clicking on the  button will open another screen showing possible full-text options.</p>
